We've been talking about the different ways that people celebrate Christmas around Hispano America. More specifically in Mexico, for instance, we learned that Mexicans start celebrating as early as December 16th with the traditional Posadas. Posadas is Spanish for inn or lodging. Mexican families re-enact the part of the Christmas story where Joseph and Mary looked around for somewhere to stay, and it goes on for the next nine evenings, until the 24th of December where Mary and Joseph finally find a place where Jesus is born. Kids heard this last class, please ask them what they learned about Las Posadas.



Our youngest students played a game where they would pass around a Frisbee that had a picture of a verb and the written word, they don't read yet so they'd have to know what verb it is just by looking at the picture. These verbs are easy for them to learn because we heard them often throughout the day. The verbs are: correr/run, dormir/sleep, caminar/walk, bailar/dance, brincar/jump, limpiar/clean, comer/eat. This game is fun, but we prefer to sing the song Caminar, caminar, y parar https://youtu.be/-csuoX_uM7U We also played a game with shapes, this time we added the Triangulo/triangle, kids noticed that it's easy to remember because it has tres/three sides tres-tri. What a great connection!



Some kids reviewed the Christmas vocabulary in a Sudoku game, it was so much fun, although it was the first time for some and it took them longer to understand the concept of the game, (which is the same as the original Japanese game Sudoku). In our version, we substitute the numbers for vocabulary words that they'd write or draw. It was definitely challenging for the whole class.

Older students got to read about Las Posadas, and they got more detailed information about it. They get very excited when we talk about things they're familiarized with, like tamales and piñatas. They've requested another recipe; what they actually want is for us to make tamales, however, since it takes a lot of time, we'll have to settle for something simpler.
